

<p>Abominate</p>	<p>(v.) To have an intense dislike or hatred for.</p> <p>Synonyms: Loathe, Abhor, Despise, Detest Antonyms: Relish, Savor, Cherish, Esteem</p>
<p>Acculturation</p>	<p>(n.) The modification of the social patterns, traits, or structures of one group or society by contact with those of another; the resultant blend.</p> <p>Synonyms: Adaptation</p>
<p>Adventitious</p>	<p>(adj.) Resulting from chance rather than from an inherent cause or character; accidental, not essential; (medicine) acquired, not congenital.</p> <p>Synonyms: Extrinsic, Incidental, Fortuitous Antonyms: Essential, Intrinsic, Inherent, Congenital</p>
<p>Ascribe</p>	<p>(v.) To assign or refer to (as a cause or source), attribute.</p> <p>Synonyms: Impute, Credit, Attribute</p>
<p>Circuitous</p>	<p>(adj.) Roundabout, not direct.</p> <p>Synonyms: Indirect, Meandering, Winding Antonyms: Straight, Direct, As The Crow Flies</p>
<p>Commiserate</p>	<p>(v.) To sympathize with, have pity or sorrow for, share a feeling of distress.</p> <p>Synonyms: Feel Sorry For, Empathize Antonyms: Feel No Sympathy For</p>
<p>Enjoin</p>	<p>(v.) To direct or order; to prescribe a course of action in an authoritative way; to prohibit.</p> <p>Synonyms: Bid, Charge, Command, Adjure Antonyms: Allow, Permit</p>
<p>Expedite</p>	<p>(v.) To make easy, cause to progress faster.</p> <p>Synonyms: Accelerate, Facilitate, Speed Up Antonyms: Hinder, Hamper, Impede, Obstruct</p>
<p>Expiate</p>	<p>(v.) To make amends, make up for; to avert.</p> <p>Synonyms: Redeem, Make Amends For, Atone, Make Reparation</p>
<p>Ferment</p>	<p>(n.) A state of great excitement, agitation, or turbulence. (v.) To be in or work into such a state; to produce alcohol by chemical action.</p> <p>Synonyms: (n.) Commotion, Turmoil, Unrest Antonyms: (n.) Peace and Quiet, Tranquility, Placidity</p>

Inadvertent	<p>(adj.) Resulting from or marked by lack of attention; unintentional, accidental.</p> <p>Synonyms: Accidental, Unconsidered Antonyms: Deliberate, Intentional, Premeditated</p>
Nominal	<p>(adj.) Existing in name only, not real; too small to be considered or taken seriously.</p> <p>Synonyms: Titular, Token, Trifling, Inconsequential Antonyms: Real, Actual, Exorbitant, Excessive</p>
Noncommittal	<p>(adj.) Not decisive or definite; unwilling to take a clear position or to say yes or no.</p> <p>Synonyms: Cagey, Uninformative, Playing it Safe, Playing it Close to the Vest Antonyms: Positive, Definite, Committed</p>
Peculate	<p>(v.) To steal something that has been given into one's trust; to take improperly for one's own use.</p> <p>Synonyms: Embezzle, Defraud, Misappropriate</p>
Proclivity	<p>(n.) A natural or habitual inclination or tendency (especially of human character or behavior).</p> <p>Synonyms: Natural Bent, Penchant, Propensity Antonyms: Inability or Incapacity</p>
Sangfroid	<p>(n.) Composure or coolness, especially in trying circumstances.</p> <p>Synonyms: Poise, Self-Assurance, Equanimity Antonyms: Excitability, Hysteria, Flappability</p>
Seditious	<p>(adj.) Resistant to lawful authority; having the purpose of overthrowing an established government.</p> <p>Synonyms: Mutinous, Rebellious, Subversive Antonyms: Supportive, Loyal, Faithful, Allegiant</p>
Tenuous	<p>(adj.) Thin, slender, not dense; lacking clarity or sharpness; of slight importance or significance; lacking a sound basis, poorly supported.</p> <p>Synonyms: Flimsy, Insubstantial, Vague, Hazy Antonyms: Strong, Solid, Substantial, Valid</p>
Vitriolic	<p>(adj.) Bitter, sarcastic; highly caustic or biting (like a strong acid).</p> <p>Synonyms: Withering, Acerbic, Mordant Antonyms: Bland, Saccharine, Honeyed, Sugary</p>
Wheedle	<p>(v.) To use coaxing or flattery to gain some desired end.</p> <p>Synonyms: Cajole, Inveigle, Soft-Soap, Sweet-Talk Antonyms: Coerce, Browbeat, Intimidate, Strong-Arm</p>
